Also talked to the individual who owns Westmoreland Realty, the warehouse that sits right behind the satellite sewage treatment facility should be receiving that easement here shortly, and we're still waiting on the railroad to review the engineering plans for the crossing applications. Thank you. At this time, I'm really saddened to announce that our brother, manner, friend and fellow employee of the city of Monessen, Marvin Davis has lost a battle with cancer and joined his sister in heaven early this morning, it is with those of us here on Earth who will miss him dearly, and our deepest sympathy goes out to his widow, Mary, while we do not yet have the details regarding the service, they will be held at the church where Marvin was served as Deacon, the Gate of Heaven, Church of God in Christ.

In Monessen, overnight, a sinkhole opened up on the 1100 block of Knox, Our engineer is in the process of obtaining quotes to have it has to determine what it's going to cost to get it excavated and repaired. Yesterday, I met with PNG. They agreed to reimburse the city for the reconstruction of Pacific Boulevard in Columbus. PNG will also reconstruct half of the leads using the concrete replacement that they damaged.

Today, we're going to be a change approving change order five, which allows us to do the pipe inspection in the lines around Marion and Montraver, both of which will be paid for by PNG or ABC. Now if we add the ninth of both upper and lower that we're approving today using CDBG funds. We have an agreement to fix them, we also have an agreement to fix the part of Reed that was damaged during Phase four. Altogether, that's seven roads that are going to be repaired here in the very near future.

And you probably know that we're planning to apply for another grant through the Westmoreland County local arts grant, if you do May 25 and that'll that grant will go towards the four concerts that we have planned this summer, so hopefully we get it. But I wanted to do it if anybody has any questions about the grant, we applied for the one two through PNC a few weeks ago, and essentially, it's the same one. There's no match involved. It's just submitted the application and hope that they like what we've written in them. The total for you, put down an amount that you want, and then they have a certain percentage that they award you if you qualify. And we it's due May 20 March, 25 and I think we'll know by June whether we get that grant. Well, we the cost of the project is a little over \$16,000 for all four what I do is I'll include the budget in the grant that I send them, so they'll know exactly what why we're asking for the amount of money that we are. So, we're hoping, with all these little grants, what comes enough together and with our donations, that will be good to go. Anybody on council have any questions about that particular grant?

One thing I do it's not on the agenda, but I wanted to make you all aware, but we had received with grateful appreciation. The Ocean Conservancy recognizes the city of Monessen for our cleanup efforts. I know there's some people in the audience who come out to the cleanups and everything, so I thought that I was really surprised to get it in the mail. So, we'll frame it, put it someplace. So just wanted to make you aware of it, if you were part of that and helped. Thank you.

And also, we've been working on a policy manual. For the civic center, we're going to hire two part-time people. So, we thought from the very beginning, they need to know how to operate the civic center. So given we've met on this council, do anybody have any questions about the policy manual? I know I've sent it to you. It's known, if anybody in the audience wants to read it, it's up in my office. You're welcome to do that.

Mayor Ron Mozer 35:27

You want to make a motion?

Councilwoman Karen Cosner 35:28

I sure do, motion to approve the city of Monessen, civic, civic center, use and reservation policy manual.

Mayor Ron Mozer 35:37

Is there a second? Second? Any questions? Call the roll.

Mike Korposh 35:42

Council person Thomas Yes. Councilman Orzechowski, yes. Council person Cosner, yes. Mayor Mozer, yes.

Councilwoman Karen Cosner 35:51

Okay. At this time, we have a presentation by Donna Vesley and Brian man if you're going to participate, but at least I want to enter. I want to introduce you. And they are from the newly organized Rotary Club, the Mon Yough Rotary Club. And what's that? River Valley. River Valley. Okay, there was a nice article in the paper. It was yesterday, so you could, if you get the paper, take gander and read it all about it. But Donna had contacted me, I don't know, a month and a half ago now, about putting up a peace pole in sit in the city park. And I had never heard of a peace pole before, so she had sent me some information about it, and I believe it's in honor of Stephanie Orchick, who Brian gave me this article, and it was in the December Mon Valley report. And Stephanie graduated, I believe, in 1972 from in essence. And she is currently the president of Rotary International, and she's a female. She the first or second female in that office. So that's amazing. So, I think we've talked about this at our work session, and do you want to come up and really talk about it? Because you know far more than I consider. I never heard of a peace poll before.

Mayor Ron Mozer 37:20

Please take a mic.

Councilwoman Karen Cosner 37:22

Sure, bring it up.

Donna Vesley 37:23

I have a very loud voice well, so as Karen said, and I don't even know if it's on, because with is it on? I was going to say with my hearing aids, I can't tell, but tell Stephanie contacted me and said that they were making a peace poll in her honor as being the Rotary International President. And she said to me, would you kind of initiate and ask if we can put the peace pole in the Monessen Park, because that's where I want it to be, because that's where I grew up and so the peace pole, and I don't know, Brian, you're pretty familiar with the Peace pole, and Rotary's initiative. Rotary is not the only one that does a peace poll, but basically it is to kind of acknowledge peace in different languages, especially the language of the community where it's going to be. So, this is not going to be the one the peace pole that we will have, because they are going to redo it, but may peace prevail on Earth. Will be done in Russian, which is Stephanie is Karpo Russian, which is part of the Slavic community. Here it will also be in Greek, because of the population here, as well as Italian and, of course, English. So the whole idea of it is that it is put in a place where you can easily see it and just reflect on why we're here and peace, and even if you're having a terrible day, go past the peace pole and just kind of keep in mind what we're all here for, and it's peace. So that's kind of one of Roy's initiatives, if you will. So you can see she's a big Steeler fan. So, when they did this, they made sure that they put a reference to the Steelers as well. So, we're asking on her behalf if we can put this in the park. And our hope is that on Earth Month, that we will debt. Indicated because she will be here. She travels the world, and she's

hardly ever home, but she's going to be here for the Orthodox Easter, which is in April. And so we thought we'd love to have a great dedication, really, a big PR presentation of she's going to be here also. So, we are asking if we can have permission to do that in the park in her honor. And I know she's proud to be resident of Monessen, obviously, and so this is where she would like it to be. Thank you.

Mayor Ron Mozer 40:34

You are a local resident. Where in the park specifically would you like to see this?

Donna Vesley 40:40

Well, Karen and I, she was kind enough to a couple mornings ago, we looked through the park. There is a, I don't know it's not a pavilion, but it's Pete. Yes, it's a so we thought that putting it right near there might be a nice area. There were some newly planted trees as well, but we went there again today, and that's kind of another thing that I'll mention a little bit later. Why did we go there today again, but we noticed. And Karen, you and I, I don't think it really, we recognize it. But as you go into after, you park your car and you walk and start to walk into the park, on the left-hand side, there's a pole there, kind of a two-by-four. Or I'm not good with that, but it's just there. And if you'll notice, can you show Brian like, I guess what the idea is for when you put this piece pole that is kind of hollow on the bottom. This is like, yeah, so it's really, ideally, you put the pole, you plant the pole in the and in the concrete, and then it's a sleeve that goes over top of it. And so that pole is already there. Now it's six feet, so it's not, you know, quite as tall. And I think this was also designed actually to go into the ground as well. So it may not work, but it was very interesting. Whoops, sorry. It is very interesting that pole there was a pool that already existed. So, it maybe could be for another peace pole that's a little shorter, I don't know, but pardon, yeah, it's very possible we could kind of but, you know, yes, so maybe we can re look at that and just see, hey, because it's right as you go into the path. So, it would be right there. I'll send you a picture. We missed it. Yeah. So that's one thing, another thing. While we were there, you know, Karen mentioned to me I'll some of the benches and things like that are in repair. And there's a bridge that was presented or by, I guess, the Monessen Rotary Club, way back when it went before it was Monessen, but the Monessen rotary club did the bridge. There's also, we think it's the lions put that for Patsy Yes. Martucci, so that roof also needs replacement, and there's a couple of things on it that need a little bit of repair. So, I said at our new rotary club, our focus is on service and service projects, and we want to do what the community needs, not necessarily what we think they need. And so, we would love to also take that on as a new rotary club, and possibly also to partner with some of the other rotary clubs. So, we were there today, actually to measure the roofs, because the roofs need replacement. And if you, especially on the bridge, if you don't replace that soon, there's already a hole there, you're going to, you'll lose the treasures, and that thing is then going to be unsafe. So, we would like to take that on. So that's why we've measured the roofs. We'd like to replace the roofs. We're a new club, so we don't have a whole lot of money. So, we are going to try to reach out to maybe some of the roofing companies in the area, see if they would what kind of cost it would be, or if they would donate it. Because it's not, I think the ones 260 square feet, and the other ones, the bridge is like 110 so we're going to be working on doing that, if that is with, you know, the your approval, and we hope then we'll get enough Rotarians and anyone else who wants to just kind of join in and try to get that repaired so that you can get a little more. Life out of it, and it will be safe.

Mayor Ron Mozer 45:02

So thank you very much, good. Just one other question, is that plastic? Or what's the case? What kind of material is that

Donna Vesley 45:11
PVC!

Mayor Ron Mozer 45:13
So I mean, is the long utility of that expected to last? How long?

Donna Vesley 45:18
Well, they've had some of them up for 12 years, they said, and they're still looking good because they see, he said, The most you might have to do is, if it gets splashed with dirt, you might want to hose it off. But other than that, I guess that the details or what's on there is weatherproof it. And again, I asked about it. He said, we've had them up for more than 12 years, and they're fine. We've not had to do anything because it is a concern. We don't want it to be too much maintenance for the city. We don't, of course, want to take over any maintenance for them from the Rotary Club either. So that was very important to make sure that it was pretty much maintenance free. So, it also has a QR code. You will see they're put on there. So, somebody does want to get information about the peace pole, and where else the peace poles are? They're all over the world. Rotary. In fact, they just dedicated one in Istanbul, Turkey this past weekend, the rotary president, Stephanie was there for that presentation.

Mayor Ron Mozer 46:23
Thank you very much for the presentation.

Donna Vesley 46:24
You're welcome.

Mayor Ron Mozer 46:26
Yes, wait till we get to the end.

Donna 46:29
Well, you can ask it about, go ahead about replacing a roof. Yeah, it's right by the path. Right by the path, yeah, yeah. Today we looked at it. There was a big hole, like I said. And if the water continues, it'll, it'll not.

Mayor Ron Mozer 47:01
We need a motion to approve the placement of the pole.

Councilwoman Karen Cosner 47:06
Well, then I'd like to make a motion to approve the placement of the peace pole in the city park. Well, we're not exactly sure where it's going to be. I mean, in the park. We you know, I want input from people, if they have suggestions, when I do the trees, I'm sure if there's 30, I'll clean it. Ernie, if you were there, you could help me. How's that?

Mayor Ron Mozer 47:35

Is there a second?

Councilwoman Lois Thomas 47:36

Second.

Mayor Ron Mozer 47:38

Any questions? Call the roll.

Mike Korposh 47:40

Council person Cosner, Yes, council person Thomas Yes. Councilman Orzechowski, yes. Mayor Mozer, yes.

Councilwoman Karen Cosner 47:48

Thank you. I'd also like to make a motion to approve the hire of Linda Carson and Curtis Wade to positions at the Civic Center of Monessen at 15 hours per week per employee, subject to the finalization of all employment testing and clearances.

Mayor Ron Mozer 48:05

Is there a second? Second? Any questions? Call the roll.

Mike Korposh 48:10

Council person Cosner, yes. Council person Thomas Yes. Councilman Orzechowski, yes. Mayor Mozer Yes.

Mayor Ron Mozer 48:18

At this time, I'd like to open the floor for public comment directed to myself on any items right in the business ordinances, statues, resolutions for daily work product intent that requires attention to the city of Monessen.

Earnie Telegraphis 48:36

Okay, when Tony gave his speech, he just read it off his paper, and he didn't answer what I wanted to know. That was over \$200,000 you paid out today. How much do we have in the bank?

Mayor Ron Mozer 48:58

He did say that, by the way, you didn't say how much total? How much was it? about 500 bucks.

Councilman Orzechowski 49:05

\$542 but we just moved \$75,000 into it from the tan, though. We have \$400,000 minus 75 so you have 325 that's in the TAN.

Ernie Telegraphis 49:08

So only \$500 is left. Well, how are we going to make it? Then we just moved, we still got how much in the kitty we have? Okay. But we're going to have now, what, 75,000 plus \$500 right? Yes, and that's all going to go next month.

Mayor Ron Mozer 49:32

But then we'll draw upon the tan.

Councilman Orzechowski 49:34

We'll probably have taxes, and by then, plus, I need to move next month 55,000 from the refuge account to the general account, because the general account paid the garbage in January.

Ernie Telegraphis 49:46

Oh, so you get that money back, we transfer, and we move it. Where should it go? Okay, I just got another question here. You guys in concert with each other. For instance, you. It is Tony, with your figures. The Treasury got his figures, and then he got the controller. The controller, to me, should be the linchpin. It's supposed to be a very important position. So, you guys interact with the controller. No,

Mayor Ron Mozer 50:18

She monitors the spending and makes sure that the bills are paid interacting with you. That's what the function of the controller is. Otherwise, they'd be in cahoots with each other,

Ernie Telegraphis 50:28

Yeah, but they don't talk to each other. So how she's going to do this? I don't know how you could maintain it is a transparency that way.

Mayor Ron Mozer 50:31

She gets all the records so that no personal interaction. It's a very separate function, and it's done that way for a reason, is to prevent collusion.

Ernie Telegraphis 50:54

I just don't know if they two got together. They said, okay, we're going to write us a check together. I'm just saying they should be checking.

Mayor Ron Mozer 51:03

They constantly check. They constantly check each other's balances.

Ernie Telegraphis 51:09

All these years, I never heard the controller said, hold it, I'm not approving this. And the controller can't. Well, we can't. You got a very powerful position there ensures that all dancers pay. Yeah, well, she could say, I don't approve this allocation, that Tony's door,

Councilman Orzechowski 51:26

Then all she doesn't do is sign the check. She's one of the two signers, so I don't sign it, or she doesn't sign it, then it doesn't get done. That's all she must do. That's all if she has a question. Then I'm going to resolve it.

Earnie Telegraphis 51:40

I guess we would ask, it doesn't happen, hasn't happened, but if you'll notice, what they what Jerry and Rosalie, what they report on, is a little bit behind what I give that is actually current and going on right now.

Councilman Orzechowski 52:01

I have to be because I need to give you figures every month, twice a month.

Earnie Telegraphis 52:06

I'm just trying to see how you guys operate. That's all.

Councilman Orzechowski 52:09

But this hasn't changed in all the years or decades. It's the way it's supposed to be for you.

Earnie Telegraphis 52:15

You can't use history like that, because if that's the case, women won't be voting. We still have slavery and all that.

Councilman Orzechowski

Folks. Where did that come from? Well, you just said you guys do all this year, all right?

Earnie Telegraphis

And then I have one last question, what are you guys doing to bring industry comments so we could start building and repairing our streets and bring people into the city

Mayor Ron Mozer 52:45

We're constantly working on that you're welcome to come up and sit down and help me do any part of that. But even as of yesterday, we had a meeting here with re-imagine Westmoreland County,

Earnie Telegraphis 52:55

Okay, but I didn't know about it.

Mayor Ron Mozer 52:57

That was because that's because that was for the Mayors and the city council of the communities of Westmoreland County.

Earnie Telegraphis 53:07

Okay, so you guys are basically up to not relying on grants. This. No, not, okay, this. RVE, what are they brought in so far? Well,

Mayor Ron Mozer 53:17

They brought in the CDBG,

Earnie Telegraphis 53:18

CDBC, is there all the time?

Mayor Ron Mozer 53:20

No, it's not all there all the time. It's there through very meticulous filing for application.

Earnie Telegraphis 53:25

Okay, so they got \$307,000 Okay, so they got \$31,000 okay, right. Okay, so that left us with, what 200 and what 272 70? How much is that went to the roads?

Mayor Ron Mozer 53:43

No, that's not true at all. First off, what we approved here today was moving money around so we could do the Upper and Lower Ninth Street. That's going to cost us right at about \$200,000

Earnie Telegraphis 53:55

Yeah, but that ain't coming from this side.

Mayor Ron Mozer 53:56

Yes, it's coming from CDBG. It's coming from multiple years of CDBG.

Earnie Telegraphis 54:01

So that's 7010 is it coming from them?

Mayor Ron Mozer 54:04

It's coming from CDBG. Absolutely okay. Next year we're planning on doing Knox. Okay, you come to these public meetings, and we explain this every time.

Earnie Telegraphis 54:14

You know it's difficult sometimes to connect. But anyway, one last question. If our SB, or whatever their name is, don't bring in any other grants, and they're just relying on the CDBD fund, are you going to renew their contract June? That's I don't know, because they're not doing anything.

Mayor Ron Mozer 54:38

They're doing everything that urban design did for 8% less.

Earnie Telegraphis 54:44

You mean urban design never brought, never brought in other grants.

Mayor Ron Mozer 54:49

They never did. Never did.

Earnie Telegraphis 54:51

I thought they did. No, well, we still gotta look for somebody that's going to bring other grants.

Mayor Ron Mozer 54:58

We've been, we've been. Are doing grants. We got grants from DCNR. We got grants. We're applying for grants.

Earnie Telegraphis 55:08

If you're doing all their work, then what do we get them for? We could save that after 31,000 Anyway, that's all I got to say. Anybody else?

Linda Lacy 55:22

Linda Lacey, 1624, Maple Avenue. I just have a comment, and then I have a question. The question is Ninth Street, you said you're going to pave from Schoonmaker all the way up Ninth Street to Summit, or is it just going to Knox?

Mayor Ron Mozer 55:42

Just to Knox?

Linda Lacy 55:45

It should go up to Motheral you should though.

Mayor Ron Mozer 55:48

We are going to Knox.

Linda Lacy 55:50

Okay, so you're going to go to Knox. So, there's going to be a new road that goes up between Knox and Ninth Street. But when you make the right turn to go into Ninth Street park that's not going to be paved until, till November. Say that again. I mean, okay, you're paving from Schoonmaker to Knox. Yes. We're going to restore and that intersection, right? And you're going to take down that ridiculous traffic light. We'll worry about that. Yes. Okay, then when you make a right to go to the park to the upper part of Ninth Street, is that included in it?

Mayor Ron Mozer 56:29

Not in this particular phase?

Linda Lacy 56:32

Okay, that's what I needed to know by now. Everybody knows that I called Rostraver Township municipal building because I was very concerned about our boat launch since the sports club came up here a couple weeks ago at our last meeting to discuss how they like our boat dock. Well, our boat dock has been in disrepair ever since 2022 and I think it was put down there in 2012 I'm not sure. But

there's also a problem other than the water level, because those barges have never been replaced. And all of a sudden, on Tuesday, the redevelopment popped in there with their great idea. Well, where were they in 22 2016 and 2012 what are they going to do that the city council can't do? Do they want you to transfer the boat launch to them? Well, why did they have their two cents in it, and why was it a big deal that I called the municipal center to find out who owns it. We own that Dock, and I think you already knew that. Of course I did, but you told us the general public at every meeting when we inquired about it, and it was leased from Ross driver. And that is not true. I

Mayor Ron Mozer 57:59

I never did say that. I said it is in Rostraver.

Linda Lacy 58:02

But I know what's in Rostraver. We lease it. No, you go back to your record.

Mayor Ron Mozer 58:08

We own it.

Linda Lacy 58:09

I never said I hear very well, yeah, that's why I sit up front. So, you go back to your records and your notes, and you'll see that you said that. Okay. The problem is, when we had that flood down there, the Redevelopment Authority didn't call the Corps of Engineers and to go down there and find our dock that floated down there, and we constantly asked him about it, and I thought that was a safety hazard, because that was a question I had for John Nestor, which he's not here. So, my thing is, is the redevelopment going to be in the process of fixing the boat launch, and why did they put their two cents in it? If they're not,

Mayor Ron Mozer 58:55

I can't answer that question.

Linda Lacy 58:56

Well, you were sitting at the same meeting I was. You didn't say anything to them. You try to suppress people who come here, who live here, they can't talk. And another thing, Karen, you asked PNC about, I'm done with you, Mr. Mayor, the next question I have is for Karen. You said you applied for a loan, for PNC, a grant, I'm sorry, a grant. Make sure, in that grant, that you apply money to have two carts, golf carts, to bring the senior citizens from the bottom of that hill up to the amphitheater. And another thing is, the amphitheater is not equipped to handle these big concerts that you plan on doing. There are no dressing rooms, there's no bathrooms up there, and you better hope that there's enough money in there to rent the artists who are coming rent them in Winnebago, a Winnebago a trailer. Yeah. Or take one of the trailers off of, what is it, Motheral, and take it up there and let them use it because when it was built, it wasn't built to have big concerts like you want to put on, and for \$750,000 that they put in there. I think it's a shame that it's inadequate. Okay, and another question I have, and thank you for the peace poll, I think that's excellent to have in our park. And like I'm saying, if the Redevelopment Authority, they should, everybody on the redevelopment authority should resign anyway, because

they're not. Nobody is fighting for the residents of Monessen, no one, and if it wasn't for us, you wouldn't even have a town.

Thank you.

Pino Cianflone 1:01:07

My name is Pino 45 Montraver, 1506 first of all, I'd like to say something about Marvin Davis. Unfortunately, he died. Pray for him. My other part is, I want to talk about Marvin Davis because I get emotional. I have known Marvin since he was a kid. I but on a good part, I went to a redeveloping this past week. Said, go all the time. As you know now, the Mayor cares he comes in and sits down with his computer, which he's taping everything, which means to mean that he has everything on that computer that happened the week before, the month before, including this past month. Okay, now, I have never been to a meeting to actually, you can't ask questions. At the end of the meeting, they ask you if you have any questions. And when you ask him a question, the asshole, what is the chairman tells you he might answer next month or the months after that which is a bunch of BS. And then they go into an Executive Session, okay? And it's real weird, they brought a copy in which we got enough problems in Monessen to where the cop could be used somewhere else, not there. There's nothing going on there. Because I asked, over eight months ago, I asked them to hold the meeting down here, because there wouldn't be tape and anybody be able to save but they deny that, because it was my ideal. Understand that, you know, I'm still going to work my ass off to get you out of office because you're not a good mayor for our city, our city is our city, just like Marvin was a ham. Anybody else have any comments? Like to make a motion to adjourn? Oh yeah, there are refreshments over there in honor of Mark Coleman. Feel free to enjoy them. But at the council meeting, I'd like to make a motion to adjourn.

Is there a second All in favor say aye. Committee is adjourned. Thank you.
